Each year we have the distinct honor of awarding two separate recognitions to members of the current graduating class. Carson possesses strong leadership characteristics, as well the dedication to attend early morning practices as part of the Broughton swim team. In addition to swimming, Carson was a varsity athlete in cross country, track and lacrosse.

Through her time at Broughton, she has also participated in many extra-curricular activities, most notably as a leader in the CAPS Camp, a weekend community and leadership development,

student government and the Y-Guides Program. Carson will attend North Carolina State University this fall.

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## Broughton Dance Teacher Wins Wake County Teacher of the Year



Betsy Graves has known she wanted to be a teacher since she came to kindergarten career day at Wake Forest Elementary School wearing her grandmother's vest with the ABC's on it while having her hair in a bun and an apple in her hand.

But Graves, who turned 27 earlier this year, didn't know what subject she wanted to teach until she was inspired by her dance classes at Wake Forest-Rolesville High School. Now Graves, who was named the 2017-18 Wake County Teacher of the Year in May, gets to do what she loves every day as the dance director at Broughton High School in Raleigh.

"I just want my students to find some sort of passion," Graves said in an interview Tuesday. "It doesn't have to be dance but something, because to go through life and to not have something that you care about, I can't imagine.

Graves, who graduated from Meredith College in 2012, has taught at Broughton since 2013. When Graves isn't meeting with her dance students during, before and after school, she's involved in a variety of other activities at Broughton.

She directs Broughton's Queen of Hearts formal dance and leads the annual Powder Puff football game. She also coordinates the Broughton Food Pantry, which provides food, clothing and other items to more than 40 students and their families each week.

Graves and her dancers plan dance lessons for the students in Broughton's self-contained special-needs classes. She also makes sure these students are included in the school's annual Queen of Hearts and Homecoming performances. She developed Broughton's first Dance Boosters organization to build support for the dance program. She has applied for and received grants that have allowed her to bring in at least three nationally renowned guest artists and choreographers each year.

Graves has taken her dancers on multi-day field trips to train in studios in New York City and to perform at Universal Studios in Los Angeles. She also coordinates their performances at many local and regional competitions, including Raleigh's SparkCon, the North Carolina Dance Festival and Meredith College's Day of Dance.

"I have seen the hours Betsy gladly and willingly puts in to ensure that she can make everything that she is involved in meaningful for her students," Margie Harrison, chairwoman of Broughton's fine and performing arts department, said in a written statement. "Not an hour goes by that she is not thinking about how to organize the next event, raise the bar artisti-

cally for her advanced students, provide opportunities for growth for her younger students or engage our school community in a more spirited way."

The Meredith College graduate also teaches free dance workshops to people dealing with trauma, children living in transition and teens who cannot afford private lessons. This past school year, she and her dancers provided free weekly dance classes to members of the Girls Club of Raleigh.

During the summer, Graves takes part in 30 to 50 hours a week of professional dance training in New York City, Los Angeles and the American Dance Festival in Durham.

For the Wake County Teacher of the Year Award, Graves received a prize package that includes a \$1,000 check. Broughton also honored her with a surprise pep rally after news of her award became public. She will now compete in the state Teacher of the Year program.

Now that I am 82 I am interested in remembering and connecting with the past. I enjoyed seeing the articles about Phyllis Peacock and Miss Penney's rules. Both of them were my teachers and I learned to write from them. Both were wonderful teachers, who their students will never forget. I went on to major in English at UNC Chapel Hill. I also remember Miss Cannon, math (no chewing gum in class!); Miss Cogdell, geometry; Miss McDearman, chemistry; and Miss Smaw, algebra. I was in the Creative Writing Club with famed author, Reynolds Price. We all knew at the time he was brilliant. He came to Nashville on a book tour and spoke at our Southern Festival of Books. He did not remember me, but that's not surprising since I was not very noticeable and he was a year ahead of me.



Funny, I just remembered getting curb service from the little store across St. Mary's Street. They came over, took our orders and brought back our food. We were not allowed to leave the school grounds at lunch. It seemed a very daring activity. I walked to and from school from my home on the corner of Glenwood Avenue and Jones Street. We didn't have back packs at the time, so the heavy books I carried seemed extra heavy as I walked home.

My sister Eunice Blair Floyd was also a graduate of Broughton, class of 1947. She died in 2013. Her 1947 Latipac is dedicated to Miss Penny.

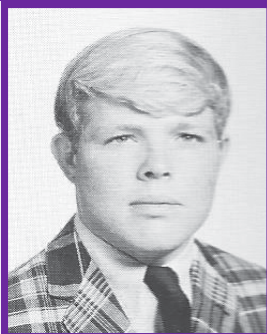

## From our Readers - Remembering a Fallen Cap



On Tuesday, November 28, 1967, SP4 Bennie Allen Smith died in Hua Nghia, South Vietnam, 220 days after arriving in Vietnam and just 17 months after graduating from Needham Broughton High School. Thanksgiving was on the 23rd that year.

I graduated with Bennie in the Class of '66. I knew who he was, but wasn't a friend. I hope I spoke to him when we passed in the halls, or had classes together, but truly don't remember. Approaching 50 years since his death, I cannot help but think of all that has transpired in the time that has passed, outside the usual typical listing of birthdays, Christmases, Memorial Days and other life events that Bennie did not experience along with the rest of us.

November 28, 1968, the first anniversary of his death, was Thanksgiving Day (the first of five that would fall on that day).

In 1970, I married my husband (after his return from Vietnam), graduated from NC State, and Broughton won the NC High School Athletic Association 4A Championship.

On December 30, 1983, our daughter was born, and NC State won the NCAA Basketball Championship in April.

Memorial Day, May 28, 1984 (16 and one-half years after Bennie's death) The Vietnam Unknown was interred at the Tomb of the Unknowns in Arlington National Cemetery.

Saturday, November 11 will be the 50th Veteran's Day since Bennie's death. I thank you, Bennie, and all Broughton Veterans for your sacrifices so I can celebrate so many special days.

Bennie was returned to the Raleigh National Cemetery. He is buried in Section 23, Plot 365. H. Hoff

## The Principal is our Pal

Did you know the Wake County school board has a SWAT team? Well, not really a team. Just one man. He wears a coat and tie and not body armor. He drives a car, not a Humvee. But when a county school is in need, he is among the first to be called. His ability to discreetly and effectively resolve situations is highly regarded; and, when he is on the job, the 'outside world' often never realizes that issues are of much consequence. The name of this SWAT team? L. Roy Teel. He personifies dedication to duty, and exudes a team spirit so necessary for the continued success of a local school system.

Roy Teel is a native of Raleigh and graduate of Enloe High School. He earned degrees in education at East Carolina University and the University of North Carolina. He began his career teaching social studies to seventh graders at Daniels Junior High. Mr. Teel joined the Broughton staff as a history teacher in 1971. He was promoted to assistant principal in 1978 and remained in that position until he was promoted in 1986 to principal of Garner High School. He retired from the school system for the first time in 1998, but the county asked him to serve as an interim assistant principal or interim principal for the next seven years. Roy officially ended his retirement in 2005 to return to Broughton as principal, a position he held for four years. In 2009 he retired again but had been doing interim work until this year. Last year he returned to Broughton as interim principal when then principal Steve Mares transferred to Athens Drive High School. During his 48 years of service to the county, Mr. Teel has worked as an administrator in 25 different schools of all educational levels including serving as principal of Broughton on three separate occasions!

Mr. Teel's priorities as a principal were always clear and concise--improve a school's academic program and increase student achievement. He strived to motivate the unmotivated. He emphasized a strict adherence to school and county policies.

Roy feels very fortunate to have spent over 20 years of his career at Broughton. He perceives the students, staff and parents to have been incredibly supportive during his time at the school. He told me his most recent five months as interim principal were "like being a grandparent". No long-term responsibilities. Just focus on day-to-day issues. In appreciation of his devotion to Broughton, the school's clock tower was named in his honor, and he was inducted into the athletic hall of fame. He tells everyone he bleeds purple and gold. Steve Mares recently said this of Mr. Teel--"he has a passion and love for Broughton that will continue to inspire excellence in all that is done inside its walls".

The class of '72 recently invited Mr. Teel to its reunion dinner, and he graciously accepted the invitation. Between bites of good food and sips of cold beverages (nonalcoholic of course), he spent several hours regaling former students with tales of his life and career. Remember in elementary school when teachers tried to help us distinguish between 'principal' and 'principle' by telling us that Mr. A or Mrs. B was our pal? We learned later that 'principal' had multiple meanings and could serve as a noun or adjective. Some of those meanings include the chief executive officer of an educational institution, a chief or main participant in a given situation, a person having prime responsibility for an obligation, a person having a starring role or a main truss or rafter that gives support to a structure. Regardless of the meaning, L. Roy Teel is a principal and quite the pal of the Wake County Public School System, the Broughton community and the NBHS Class of '72! Thanks Roy!



One football practice will wear most people out. A second one in the same day for sure, at least for most people.

That's not the case for Peter Daniel. N.C. State coach Dave Doeren thought it was odd when he saw Daniel, who began his career as a walk-on, out in the parking lot in between practices.

"Where are you going?" Doeren asked Daniel, now a fifth-year senior, during the coach's first training camp at N.C. State in 2013.

"I have to go to work," Daniel said, explaining that he worked for a landscape company to help pay his college expenses.

"We've got another practice," Doeren said.

"I know," Daniel said. "I'll be back."

A lot of hours behind a lawn mower, and even more calories, went into Daniel earning a scholarship with N.C. State's football team.

College football programs have turned the "walk-on gets a scholarship" moments into a Hallmark holiday. One emotional video after another – one Mid-American Conference school even had Sylvester Stallone make a cameo to present the good news – pops up every August.

Daniel had seen a few but still had no idea what was coming on Aug. 10 when Doeren had asked him to talk to the team at the Murphy Center.

"I was blown away," Daniel said. "They surprised me with it."

Daniel's story, from lanky high school swimmer to hulking ACC blocker, has a little bit of everything. He has gained nearly 90 pounds since his freshman year. There's the landscaping side business, he started in his neighborhood when he was at Broughton. And he's one of the best students on the team, making the Dean's List every semester in college.

"Pete's one of the hardest working guys I have ever been around," senior guard Tony Adams said.

Once known by his family as "Little Peter," because he shares the same name as his dad, his parents have changed his nickname to "Peter the Great." Daniel, who only played one year of high school football, has transformed from a 216-pound defensive end into a 305-pound left guard.

When Daniel got up to speak in front of the team earlier this month, a usual practice Doeren asks of seniors during training camp, he figured it was a chance to share his experience and to thank the coaches who helped him get there.

There were pictures on a projection screen behind him of how his physique has progressed through his college career. Oblivious to what was about to happen, Daniel made a few brief, understated remarks.

When he started to walk back to his seat the words "5 years later, you are on scholarship!!!" flashed on the screen. You can't hear what Daniel says next because he was swarmed by his jubilant teammates.

Doeren finally explained to the team the extra effort, and extra jobs Daniel worked, to get to this point.

"I can't say enough about the kid," Doeren said. "That kind of commitment, there's not many people like that. It's a huge tribute to his work ethic."

## Watching games with dad

Football and N.C. State are part of Daniel's family history, which stretches back to the 1840s in Raleigh.

Daniel's great, great uncle was Wallace "WC" Riddick, who was the head coach at North Carolina College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts, as it was known then, in the late 1890s.

Riddick would later become the president of N.C. State in the 1920s and the first dean of the engineering school, a post he held into the '30s. Riddick Stadium, the on-campus home for Wolfpack football until 1965, was named for him.

Daniel's grandfather, Raleigh Daniel, was an all-Southern Conference halfback for Wake Forest in the 1930s.

His dad, Peter Sr., graduated from N.C. State in 1976 – and watched David Thompson and Lou Holtz bring the high-profile sports teams to new heights – which meant Daniel would be a Wolfpack fan for life.

Daniel went to his first Wolfpack football games when he was 4.

"I remember sitting on the hill and watching games with my dad," Daniel said.

With the sports Daniel loved in middle school and early in high school, he never could have imagined he'd wind up playing in the same stadium as his favorite stars, like Philip Rivers and Russell Wilson.

## Hockey player

Daniel got swept up in the Carolina Hurricanes Stanley Cup run in 2006. He was 12 and he went to the White House with his dad, who is an executive vice president with the North Carolina Farm Bureau, when the team met President Bush in '07.

He decided his future was in hockey. He played for youth club team until his senior year at Broughton. He was also a freestyle swimmer. He only joined the football team for his final season.

He showed enough to get an invitation to walk-on with the Wolfpack. Mike Uremovich, the former offensive line coach, saw a big frame and potential in Daniel, but Daniel would need to add weight.

Daniel has put on close to 80 pounds since his days at Broughton. He spent his first two years on the scout team. By his third year, he made the travel team and got on the field for special teams in all 13 games. Last year, he continued his punt and field-goal unit duties and got his first snaps on offense in wins over William & Mary, Old Dominion and Vanderbilt.

There are a number of persons I wish I had asked to sign my Latipacs. Wish I had signed theirs as well. I guess I just didn't see them during those last hectic days of the school year. Have no idea why I didn't search for them. But perhaps I can say something more meaningful now that I've grown up a bit. Fortunately, introspection has no expiration date.

Something like "thank you for sharing my journey and allowing me to share yours. I am a better person today and I'll be a better person tomorrow because I have learned from you. Please know I will always honor and remember you and our Broughton experiences."

My niece will graduate from Broughton this year. When her high school days end and she's asked to sign Latipacs, I hope she listens to her heart and lends it her voice. As the years go by, her written words will resonate, and their meaning will be treasured.
